

SAKU-TAKU-NO-KI



Saku-taku-no-ki is a Japanese expression describing when a story is conceptualized in a writer's mind.

Saku-taku-no-ki is the instant a chick pecking on the inside of the egg and the mother pecking on the outside of the egg reach the same spot. The egg cracks open. New life emerges.

Saku- the special sound a mother hen makes tapping on an egg with her beak.
Taku- the sound a chick makes tapping from within.
No-ki- the moment the tappings come together.

PS Did you know that baby chicks peep while in the shell?
The mother hen can hear them cheeping and talking to her as they are growing and before they hatch.
